

However, I am often not home to supervise them while on-line. We have bought filter software. But I am not a computer expert and even still, inappropriate e-mails find their way to our computer. Which makes me wonder what else is dipping through?

I support Docket No. 07-16 because it puts the responsibility for blocking pornography at the network provider level. The M2Z proposal is family-friendly and creates network level indecency solutions that are more secure. People who are not concerned about filtering content would be required to turn off the filtration system instead of forcing parents who have a very real concern to become IT experts.

Dear Chairman Martin:

As **an** educator and former chair of the Dallas School Board I am writing you today in support of proposals that would provide free nationwide internet **access**.

There is a digital divide in our nation that separates children in their educational learning opportunities. While those from higher income families have access to the internet and **use** it regularly for their school work, many from our lower income families do not. The Dallas School District and other school districts have **worked** hard to eliminate this divide, but it continues to exist and will continue to exist until such time as we **can** provide an affordable and easy to access internet capability for all in our country.

According to the Department of Education, only 59% of children have access to the internet, only 41% of children from households with less than \$20,000 in income **use** the internet. That is unacceptable.

It is my understanding that you have before you a proposal from M2Z Networks (Docket # 07-16) on this issue. I would hope that you would give this proposal your consideration. It offers our country the opportunity to eliminate the digital divide in our educational system creating greater education opportunities for each child and youth.

Mr. Chairman:


