To restore America's leadership in high speed Internet services, the FCC must ensure that the upcoming auction sets aside at least 30 MHz of spectrum for open and non-discriminatory Internet access. It would be a big mistake to hand over these airwaves to the very same phone and cable companies that dominate the wireline market. We need more competition and innovation, not more of the same. This new wireless spectrum must be open and neutral so that America can build a better Internet for everyone.

The public airwaves belong to the public, and they should be allocated in a way that benefits the people of the US, not the bottom lines of big corporations. If more Americans are connected to the internet affordably, the economy will benefit. It is the responsibility of the FCC to act in the public interest and set aside bandwidth for wireless internet access for all.
