Dear Ms. Dortch:

This is to report that yesterday, June 19, 2007, I met with Bruce Gottlieb, Legal Advisor to Commissioner Michael Copps, and Conner Raso, an intern.

During the meeting, I reiterated QUALCOMM's opposition to the proposals in Google's May 21st ex parte letter regarding the Lower 700 MHz E Block (Channel 56). I provided an update on QUALCOMM's substantial progress in launching its highly innovative and beneficial MediaFLO service across the United States. I pointed out that MediaFLO is a one-way mobile TV service operating on the adjacent Lower 700 MHz D Block, an unpaired 6 MHz block, thereby demonstrating that Google is wrong in claiming that the Lower 700 MHz E Block lacks commercial value because, like the D Block, the E Block is also an unpaired 6 MHz block. There is no good reason for the Commission to adopt Google's proposal to prohibit one-way services, such as MediaFLO, from operating on the Lower 700 MHz E Block or to impose the vague new mandate proposed by Google on this block.

In addition, I explained QUALCOMM's opposition to Aloha Partners' proposal that the Commission alter the Lower 700 MHz Band Plan that the Commission has tentatively concluded to adopt to provide that the Lower 700 MHz E Block be licensed by Economic Areas ("EAs") instead of Regional Economic Area Groupings ("REAGs"). I noted that contrary to Aloha's arguments, many of the licensees of the Lower 700 MHz C Block are rural telephone companies who, to the extent they are interested, already can use that spectrum to launch mobile TV, and I argued that the Commission should not alter the band plan to suit Aloha's current business desires. Moreover, there is absolutely no basis for Aloha's claim that the E Block will be "given" to QUALCOMM if the spectrum is licensed by REAGs.
