Dear FCC:

I am a current Sirius subscriber. I have been subscribing for two years, but survived just fine for the first 31 years of my life without it. With the current FREE radio stations on the internet, terrestrial radio (digital and analog), and cable/satellite TV providers I have always had adequate access to music. While I enjoy listening to Sirius radio for entertainment, I still receive all important local/national public service announcements and weather reports from terrestrial radio. If, due to a perceived monopoly, the new XM Company attempted to raise their prices beyond what I (a consumer) believe appropriate; I would simply cancel the service and tune my radio to something other than 87.9 FM. Satellite radio provides no function vital to the public's well being, safety, or even happiness. Blocking the merger between XM and Sirius would be pointless. A block would only serve to dissatisfy current subscribers who would otherwise benefit from a larger programming package at a price comparable to what we already pay. Please permit their license agreement to be modified to allow this merger.
