The iPhone has set the stage for the future of mobile Internet -- but bad policies allow companies like AT&T and Verizon to shackle great gadgets to their closed networks.

To free wireless Internet, the FCC and Congress must use the 700MHz spectrum auction to create an open network that gives consumers:

1. The freedom to use whatever device we want on any network.
2. The freedom to choose among many providers in a competitive wholesale marketplace.
3. The freedom to access any content or services we want through our devices.

These true open access standards should apply to the entire wireless market.

Over 20 years ago, Congress broke up 'Ma Bell' because it limited competition - which it did. It also provided a telephone with the service and provided repair service with the phone. Except for long distance, the phone bill hovered between 5 and 8 dollars a month.

Now, I am forced to choose a plan for a year, or 2 years, and I am stuck with that 'plan' no matter how many better deals come along. I buy my own phone, and poison the earth when it breaks. Service is unheard of, and so is choice.

Ma Bell is doing well however. Now they call her AT&T. The bill's gone up though. The i phone costs over 500 up front, and AT&T is charging \$100 a month to use it.

That's the charge, for no phone and no land lines. Pretty steep rent on the PUBLIC AIRWAYS!
