This letter is to inform you that on November 19, 2007, Charles W. McKee, Director – Government Affairs, Sprint Nextel Corporation; Patrick Halley, Director – Government Affairs, National Emergency Number Association; Art Prest, Managing Director, Art Prest & Associates, representing the Rural Cellular Association; and Brian F. Fontes, Vice President External Affairs, AT&T, met with Jeffery Goldthorp, Chief – Communications Systems Analysis Division and Jeff Cohen, Senior Legal Counsel, both in the Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau, to discuss the above captioned matter.

The information discussed in the meeting focused on the recommendation that the FCC create an Emergency Telecommunication Advisory Committee (ETAC) to address issues raised by the FCC in its Notice revising the Enhanced E-911. Also, the ETAC would be designed to create test beds for location technologies and would include the participation of PSAPs, wireless carriers, third-party vendors and others integral to the provisioning of location for those making 911 calls. The ETAC concept or a variation of ETAC was included in the filings of some in the wireless industry and NENA.
