The Internet has become a vital part of American life. We rely on web-based communication to learn, work, play and communicate on issues of importance to our communities. That is why all American families, schools, independent businesses and charitable organizations need access to Internet service that is fast, free and family-friendly.

America's future broadband infrastructure must allow families access to the benefits of the internet without requiring them to seek out indecency filters. Network providers should take a more active role in blocking indecent material online and help parents protect their children from the dangers of the Internet. Parents should not be expected to become computer experts in order to protect their children from online pornography and children should not be denied the learning opportunities available online because their parents fear they will be exposed to inappropriate content.

Implementation of a proposal now pending with the FCC, such as the one submitted by M2Z Networks (www.m2znetworks.com) to provide a universal, free, fast, and family-friendly broadband service, is supported by the Coalition for Free Broadband Now and is a necessary step to protecting our children online while ensuring that all Americans have affordable Internet access.

The Internet has become an integral part of American life. We rely on it to learn, work, play and communicate on issues of importance to our communities. That is why all Americans - regardless of income, education or location - need access to Internet service that's fast, free and family-friendly.

Our nation's future broadband system must be engineered to bridge the digital divide that now separates too many Americans because of their economic circumstances and where they live. We must extend to all Americans the opportunity to take part in e-commerce, use government services, access news, information and educational opportunities and participate in civic discourse online.

Unfortunately, current broadband prices in the United States are too high and far too many households have limited or no connectivity. No American should be left behind because existing broadband options are not affordable or unavailable. Furthermore, the government should be working with business leaders to make sure that all students have Internet access that is fast, reliable and as safe as possible. Parents and teachers are currently saddled with the burden of trying to protect children from indecent content on the Internet. Network level filtration of indecent content is the best solution available to ensure that children cannot access explicit Websites, allowing parents and teachers to focus on the educational resources available online.

Implementation of a fast, free, and family-friendly universal broadband access program, like the proposal submitted by M2Z Networks (www.m2znetworks.com) and supported by the Coalition for Free Broadband Now, is a necessary step towards protecting our children online while ensuring that all Americans have affordable Internet access. This solution would remove many of the technological challenges currently faced by underserved communities ? both urban and rural. It will also help build an Internet-savvy population to drive the American economy to compete globally, provide the equality of access that is such an important step towards equality of opportunity.
