





This past Friday, July 20, the Jackson City Council convened a Special Session to discuss the current state of broadband adoption and affordability in our city. My colleagues and I, as well as the Mayor and the Governor, are all working to make Jackson a leading 21st Century city with a robust economy, a well-educated citizenry and the best possible quality of life for its citizens. Broadband services and the myriad of benefits they bring to communities like Jackson are the cornerstone of our efforts to remake our great city.

At the Special Session my colleagues and I heard from city officials, broadband service providers, and industry experts. You can learn more about the meeting at: http://www.wlbt.com/Global/story.asp?S=6819846&nav=menu119_3. The session made it abundantly clear to us that the federal government can help make broadband more available and more affordable for the citizens of Jackson. In particular, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) can and should promulgate policies to encourage competition and new investment in telecommunications, especially those that use wireless spectrum. These policies will ensure robust and affordable broadband connections for ALL of our citizens and can help reinvigorate growth in Jackson and are critical ingredients to our plan to make Jackson a leading 21st Century city.

In this regard, we also heard from M2Z Networks, Inc. CEO John Muleta. M2Z and its Silicon Valley investors have developed a creative solution to encourage broadband adoption by making it free of recurring charges. Using a piece of radio spectrum that is currently underutilized, M2Z will build the first free nationwide wireless broadband network. M2Z has committed to deploy in Jackson at the earliest point possible in its nationwide buildout and the city is currently considering entering into a franchise agreement to make its radio towers and fiber optic network available on a commercial basis in order to help spur M2Z's buildout. This is the kind of innovative private sector solution to the digital divide that all of us should applaud and support heartily.

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The leadership of Jackson is committed to ensuring that broadband services are available to all our citizens regardless of creed, color or economic status, and we will do everything in our power to make that happen. What we need now is for you to encourage the FCC to support M2Z's long pending application so we can achieve our goal.

Additionally, I would very much like to schedule a time with you so I can come to Washington in the near future to discuss this matter with you in greater detail.

Dear Chairman Martin:

As the Attorney General of the State of Utah, I take great pride in our state's commitment to securing the safety and prosperity of our families and children. With the advent of the Internet, however, that job has gotten considerably more difficult. We now face challenges from online predators and a seemingly endless supply of free and easily accessible pornography on the Internet. I have personally traveled all over our state warning children, parents and teachers to be ever vigilant about the threats posed by online predators. I also led the Attorney General's Office to a 100% conviction rate in the prosecution of child pornographers that use the Internet to abuse children, my ICAC Task Force has been recognized by FBI Director Mueller as the most successful Task Force in the Nation. It was my office that created the Utah's AMBER Alert program, and recently, DOJ recognized my Communication Director, Paul Murphy, as the first National Amber Alert Coordinator of the Year. We also helped pass legislation to create the state's Child Protection Registry. But even with all of this great work done we know there is still more that can be done to make sure that our children are kept safe.

These ever rising threats to our children are why I took the lead in drafting, and Governor Jon Huntsman signed, legislation into law that would have given parents an exceedingly valuable tool in the fight against online pornography by requiring Utah Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to block pornographic web pages at their consumers' request. The law further required a list of pornographic sites to be compiled and made failure to abide by the terms of the statute a felony offense. Unfortunately, and in direct disregard for the will of Utahans, the law was challenged by the Porn industry and to save portions of the law, the Utah Legislature was forced to repeal the provisions of the law that required the creation of the adult content registry by ISPs.

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
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Clearly, the Utah state government is doing all it can do to fight the scourge of pornography on the Internet and to keep our children safe online. But, as evidenced by ongoing litigation, we absolutely need help from the private sector to make further gains in this war on the obscene. That is why I am very excited about the pending application of M2Z Networks to provide a nationwide, family-friendly broadband Internet service. M2Z's service will be made kid safe through the incorporation of a network based filter into the architecture of their system. This means that when users sign on to the M2Z service and request websites that include indecent or pornographic materials those sites will be blocked before they ever reach the user's computer screen. This is a tremendously important application that will help parents, teachers and caregivers build a wall around the children they care for to keep pornography out. Furthermore, because this technology will be built into the network architecture, parents will no longer need to become home IT experts in order to ensure that their software based content filters are fully online, up to date and operational – especially given that our curious, tech savvy kids and teenagers are all too often capable of circumventing these PC based filters with relative ease.

As a concerned parent of five incredible children who are pre “connected” computer users, I am very impressed by M2Z's content filtering commitments. As an Attorney General, though, I am extremely excited because I believe that M2Z's voluntary commitments are much less likely to be summarily rolled back by a court ruling. In Utah, we intentionally limited the scope of our child protection law by mandating blocking of websites only when a consumer opted-in for the safeguards. Even these efforts were not enough to overcome initial constitutional challenges. As you recently experienced with the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit, the courts are highly skeptical of government imposed mandates that provide families with tools to build electronic environments that keep their children safe. M2Z's service offering is valuable because its commitment to prevent the delivery of indecent content to consumers on its free network is *voluntary*. Legally speaking, this is important because, rather than being required to filter content by regulators, M2Z is volunteering to filter content as a means of protecting the minors that need access to its free, ubiquitous service the most. From the regulators perspective, M2Z's commitment should be extremely appealing as the company has made this filtering obligation an enforceable condition of its license application.

Given the pressing public interest need to protect kids from indecency online, I urge you to grant M2Z's license application so children across the nation can be protected while on the Internet. This is so important to me, that I would be happy to visit Washington D.C. anytime to meet with you and answer your questions or further discuss this proposal. RE: Network-Level Filtered Wireless Broadband Service

Dear Chairman Martin:

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) is a great admirer of the FCC and its important work. We worked together in developing the plan that brought the Amber Alert into the Emergency Alert System (EAS), an effort that has already saved 336 children. NCMEC, the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association (CTIA) and the FCC worked together on the Wireless Amber Alert initiative, and there are many other examples.

NCMEC does not endorse commercial products or services, nor has it commented on proposals before the FCC in the past. Nonetheless, I am writing today because one such proposal before you has piqued our interest, and entails new technology that we believe has great implications for America's families.

The Internet is a powerful, important resource for children and families. Yet, there is a dark side. Since 1998, NCMEC has handled 500,000 reports from the public and from Internet Service Providers regarding child pornography, online enticement of children, and other forms of child sexual exploitation. We know that child pornography has become a multi-billion dollar industry worldwide. NCMEC's Child Victim Identification Program (CVIP) is working with law enforcement around the world to identify the child victims and rescue them. To date, our CVIP analysts have reviewed 9 million images and videos, resulting in the identification of more than 1,100 children. Thousands more have not yet been identified.

New technologies are critical if we are to fight this new breed of online predators. We have seen various efforts to attack this problem through law fail to meet constitutional muster in the courts. It is clear that if we are going to address this problem effectively in the future, the private sector must lead the way.

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Yet, the challenges are enormous. Recent NCMEC research conducted by the Crimes Against Children Research Center at the University of New Hampshire found that 1 in 7 children who are regular Internet users will be sexually solicited online, and that 34% of children are encountering unwanted sexual content online, up from 25% just five years ago.

To address these challenges, we joined with Boys and Girls Clubs of America to create the NETSMARTZ workshop. We have implemented this animated, fun, interactive program in 3,000 Boys and Girls Clubs and are now reaching millions of other children through schools, youth organizations, and in the home.

Nevertheless, we need to do more. One of the primary challenges is to mobilize and involve parents. The University of New Hampshire research found that even after more than a decade of emphasizing the importance of parental controls, filters, blocking software, etc., just 55% of America's parents use such tools.

Thus, we were encouraged to learn that there is a proposal before you from M2Z Networks, Inc. that would create a nationwide broadband wireless service that will be filtered for indecent content at the network level. This type of filtering is one of the best tools we have to fend off online predators, and prevent inappropriate content from reaching children. If this technology is effective, it would ensure that pornographic and other indecent materials would never reach the user's computer. Network-level filtering is superior to software-based solutions that can be easily subverted or disabled.

We are intrigued by the potential, and hope you will give this proposal careful consideration. It represents a new tool that could significantly enhance the ability of parents to protect their children. Again, I do not write as an endorser or promoter of this company or any company or product, nor do I write to attempt to influence your judgments and those of your fellow Commissioners regarding the intricacies of the FCC process. However, I do write as someone who believes that we need new tools and approaches.
