The Norristown office of Comcast confirms that they are actively and intentionally delaying connections to the internet by 10 seconds for an unknown reason. Additionally, they filtering VPN and other port transactions that are advertised as part of the provided services.

After reading about the Associated Press' article on Comcast, I am concerned that Comcast may be interfering with other functionality as well.

In my township of Lower Gwynedd, Comcast is the only allowed internet service provider. And while that is a matter that I must take up with the township, it represents a monopoly which prevents me from exercising my right to choose an alternative provider.
