Being from rural America, I have become increasingly concerned with the lack of interest in making broadband available in the area I live in. No doubt, this is a decision being made based on the financial bottom line. The area I live in is not densely populated but I feel that we are just as entitled to broadband internet access as is any American. We are however, as rural Americans, being placed on an unequal playing field. Our children no longer have the same opportunities for learning and research that are available to those citizens with faster and more readily available internet connections. I am not however blind to the broadband options which are available to rural America but feel that they are of an extremely poor quality in comparison with DSL, Cable and of course FiOS or equivalent internet options. The options, such as satellite internet, are also nearly triple the price of other available broadband services. Also, the amount of money it costs to purchase the equipment for such satellite services makes them completely unaffordable for a lot of rural Americans. I believe M2Z's initiative represents a very practical and cost affective way of building a nationwide broadband network. The fact that the base level will be free and family friendly is also of great importance. More importantly, however, I feel that this service or something like it will reverse a current state of inequality that exists among Americans in this technological age that we live in, a state of inequality that should be allowed to continue. Please make the right decision to bring rural and poor America to the same level of knowledge and learning available to the rest of America, and allow us to be a part of the national and global community so many Americans already enjoy.

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America's broadband Internet goals are going unmet and America's international position is rapidly falling. Many American families, schools and libraries cannot afford broadband and most of rural America cannot even access broadband Internet.

Once online, many families are concerned about the growing threat to children of easily accessible indecent and pornographic material. And public safety organizations often can't work together due to incompatible data networks.

The FCC has the power to change all this overnight -- and so I urge you to incorporate M2Z Networks (www.m2znetworks.com) plan to provide 95% of America with access to a free, fast, and family-friendly wireless
