Dear Ms. Dortch:

On behalf of DIRECTV, Inc., and pursuant to the Commission's recent *Order* in this docket, I am pleased to provide the first of several reports on DIRECTV's consumer education efforts related to the ongoing digital transition.¹ DIRECTV is proud of its efforts as a DTV.gov Transition Partner.² We have designed the initiatives described below so that DIRECTV subscribers will be able to reap all of the transition's many benefits, while assuring continuity of service during and after the transition.

Billing Notices. Prior to issuance of the *Order*, DIRECTV included DTV transition information with its bills. These "bill stuffers," a copy of which is attached as Exhibit 1, were sent out with the March 2008 bills. This month, DIRECTV will update this information to reflect the additional requirements set forth in the *Order*.³ This information will be provided to the customer as a bill stuffer, on the bill itself, or both. In addition, a Spanish translation has been provided for our customers who subscribe to Spanish language packages.

Notices Accompanying Equipment. In accordance with paragraph 46 of the *Order*, DIRECTV is working with its manufacturers to include digital transition information with its set-top boxes and over-the-air tuners.⁴ Copies of these notices – one for equipment with a digital tuner and one for equipment without a digital tuner – are attached as Exhibits 2 and 3, respectively.

Public Service Announcements. On March 27, 2008, DIRECTV began running a thirty-second public service announcement. It ran roughly 300 times prior to the beginning of April, primarily on "Family and Lifestyle" channels, and is scheduled to run in the future between 300 and 900 times a month on a broader range of channels. DIRECTV is also airing a sixty-second public service announcement, in both English and Spanish, to be shown in connection with the DIRECTV Más service. Each of these announcements is contained on a video CD enclosed with this letter.

DIRECTV.com. DIRECTV has made several improvements to its "DIRECTV.com" website in order to help facilitate the digital transition. Last month, DIRECTV introduced a DTV transition-related video tutorial, hosted by "Diane," DIRECTV's online assistant. The video can be found at www.directv.com/dtv2009, along with additional information regarding the transition. A copy of this landing page is attached as Exhibit 4.

Call Centers. In early March, DIRECTV provided its customer service representatives with general information, frequently asked questions, and sample scripts related to the digital transition. This information will be updated as appropriate to ensure that its customer service representatives are able to answer the myriad of questions that consumers may have about the digital transition. DIRECTV also has begun training sessions for its customer service representatives, which should be concluded within three weeks. Furthermore, in early April, DIRECTV included information related to the digital transition in its weekly Team Leader Newsletter. DIRECTV will include additional information in subsequent publications as necessary.



How to get your local channels after the Digital Transition.

If you get your local channels via an off-air antenna and not from DIRECTV, there are a few ways to make sure you can still view them after the digital transition. First, check if DIRECTV provides locals in your area. If so, simply upgrade your package to include your local channels. If not, come back to this page and read on.

Can't get locals from DIRECTV where you live? Here are some solutions.

DIRECTV® HD (HR20) or DIRECTV Plus® HD DVR (HR21 only)
Simply plug the off-air antenna (sold in all major electronics retailers) into the digital tuner built in to your receiver. The receiver will recognize the off-air channels and integrate them into the Advanced Program Guide.



The new DIRECTV Plus® HD DVR (HR21)
You will need an off-air antenna and a DIRECTV® AM21 Off-Air Tuner, which will seamlessly integrate the off-air channels into your receiver's Advanced Program Guide. DIRECTV® AM21 Off-Air Tuners will be available for purchase from DIRECTV soon.

Any DIRECTV digital receiver other than the three above
If your TV has a digital tuner, you can simply connect it to your off-air antenna. You'll be able to view all digital channels available in your area; however, they won't be integrated into your receiver's Advanced Program Guide.

If your TV doesn't have a digital tuner, you'll need a digital-to-analog converter box, which is sold in all major electronics retailers. Go to [http://www.fcc.gov](#) or call 1-888-DTV-2009 (1-888-388-2009) to request a \$40 converter box coupon from the U.S. government.

You may still be able to receive a limited number of off-air television stations ("low power," "Class A" or "translator" stations) on your analog TV without a converter. And, of course, the Digital Transition will not affect your ability to watch pre-recorded movies and play video games using your existing equipment.
