**SAN DIEGANS DONATE A RECORD NUMBER OF MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS TO LOCAL SCHOOLS TO HELP THE KIDS**

*“Music Matters” program sponsored by KSDS Jazz 88.3 FM and Coles Fine Flooring sees record donations*

**SAN DIEGO—(March XX, 2008)** Cash-strapped schools in San Diego had something to sing about last week. The 4th annual “Music Matters” program, co-sponsored by KSDS Jazz 88.3 FM (a service of San Diego City College) and Coles Fine Flooring, brought in record high of 88 musical instruments for San Diego Unified Schools music programs. To celebrate the record donations received, Coles Fine Flooring (who offered their stores as drop off locations for the drive) hosted a celebration ceremony where all the instruments were put on display, the Mission Bay High School Dixieland Jazz Band put on a show and a large group of community members attended the event.

This month-long program collects musical instruments and then gives them to the Community Council for Music in the Schools (CCMS), where they are completely refurbished and made available to students who cannot afford to purchase or rent instruments of their own. More and more kids are discovering the benefits and joys of musical instruction thanks to this groundbreaking program.

“This is by far our biggest year,” says Mark DeBoskey, KSDS station manager. “We have received a 50 percent increase in donations over the previous record we set last year. We are thrilled with the momentum the Music Matters program is gaining.”

“It couldn’t be more timely to contribute to the city schools and their music programs with the looming California school budget cuts, which will very likely hurt music programs just as they have in the past,” says George Coles, President of Coles Fine Flooring. “This program is a great way for Coles to show support for keeping music programs in schools.”

Anne Marie Haney, co-chair of CCMS says, “This year CCMS has over 800 instruments out on loan all over the school district, many of which have been

donated through the Music Matters program. These donations directly benefit students by giving them the opportunity to make music. Studies have shown time and again that musical instruction can have profoundly positive effects for children, academically and socially. We are deeply concerned that with budget cuts students might lose the opportunity to play music.”

#### **About CCMS:**

The Community Council for Music in the Schools (CCMS) is a nonprofit organization founded in 1990 under the umbrella of the San Diego State University Foundation. CCMS promotes and supports music education in the public schools, working in partnership with music organizations in the private sector that provide music enrichment to students. A major project of CCMS is the collection and repair of donated instruments, which are issued to school music teachers for loan to needy students who are unable to rent or purchase an instrument. From 1999-2005, nearly 600 instruments have been placed in 60 San Diego City Schools, grades 4-12. CCMS depends on cash donations for maintaining the instruments in top playing condition. All contributions are tax deductible.







Thank you for your prompt response to our appeal on behalf of the Wicomico County Child Advocacy Center. As a result of your generosity, combined with the \$20,000 donated by WMDT and the Community Foundation, the Center will be able to continue its work to ensure that abused and neglected children in Wicomico County receive comprehensive and sensitive treatment.


