**Re: Written Ex Parte Presentation
Regarding Docket No. 07-195**

Dear Ms. Dortch:

QUALCOMM Incorporated (“Qualcomm”) hereby submits the following written ex parte presentation in the above-referenced proceeding. In the proceeding, which concerns the so-called AWS-3 band, the name given to the band which was originally 2155 to 2175 MHz, there have been conflicting claims by various parties as to whether two-way mobile wireless service on 2155 to 2175 MHz will cause harmful interference to mobile reception on 2110-2155, the AWS-1 mobile receive band. Qualcomm understands that the ruling under consideration by the Commission and on the open meeting agenda for the Commission’s June 12, 2008 open meeting would expand the AWS-3 band to 2155 to 2180 MHz, an expanded AWS-3 band on which comments were not sought, and would establish service rules for the expanded band, thereby resolving the competing arguments about harmful interference. However, there are no tests in the record to establish whether or not there will be harmful interference from two-way operations on 2155 to 2180 MHz into the AWS-1 receive band. Thus, for the expanded 2155 to 2180 MHz band, there is no evidence to prove whether or not there will be harmful interference into the AWS-1 mobile receive band.

Qualcomm believes that the Commission should not adopt a ruling now on the basis of the incomplete record. Rather, the Commission should defer adopting a ruling in this proceeding until definitive testing can be completed to determine conclusively whether there will be harmful interference from two-way operations on AWS-3, whether that band will be 2155 to 2175 MHz or 2155 to 2180 MHz, into the AWS-1 mobile receive band; and, if so, whether limitations on AWS-3 operations, however that band will be constituted, would prevent such harmful interference, or whether operations on the AWS-3 band must be limited to downlink only.
