Dear Ms. Dortch:

On June 10, 2008, W. Russell Withers, Jr. of Withers Broadcasting Companies, John Beck of Emmis Communications, and Susan Davenport Austin of Sheridan Broadcasting Corporation, members of the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB), and the undersigned of NAB, met with Chairman Kevin Martin, Elizabeth Andrion and Robert Kenny of the Commission to discuss the following matters. Cecilia Kang of the Washington Post also attended the meeting at Chairman Martin's request.

First, the attendees inquired as to the status of the Commission's pending Notice of Proposed Rulemaking seeking comment on proposed rules changes that would allow AM radio stations to deploy FM translators, and explained that amending the Commission's rules in this manner would promote localism by enabling AM stations to enhance service to their local communities.


Second, the attendees discussed their concerns over several aspects of the Commission's recently issued Report and Notice of Proposed Rulemaking regarding Localism. In particular, the parties discussed the relative costs and benefits of reinstating obligations on broadcasters to locate a station's main studio within its community of license, to maintain radio station personnel on-site at all times, and the enhanced disclosure requirements proposed in the Notice.

Third, the attendees expressed their opposition to the proposed merger of XM Satellite Radio and Sirius Satellite Radio, noting the unprecedented nature of this merger, in that it would enable one entity to control all of the spectrum allocated to a particular service.

Finally, the attendees briefly raised a pending proposal to possibly convert television channels 5 and 6 to FM radio service, although did not discuss this issue in any detail.
