Dear Ms. Dortch:

On May 4, 2009, Robin Wilson, Vice President, Business Development, Nagravision USA, Inc. ("Nagravision") (via telephone) and the undersigned met with Rudy Brioché, Legal Advisor to Commissioner Adelstein regarding the pending application for review of the January 16, 2009 Memorandum Opinion and Order in the above-captioned proceeding.

During the meeting, Mr. Wilson reiterated Nagravision's position that the Cablevision approach to downloadable security (as we understand it) may have merit as a downloadable security system, and may meet the requirements of Section 629, but only if wider participation in its development occurs. Nagravision believes that such a downloadable system is achievable in a reasonably short timeframe and has committed to participate in an endeavor to define it.

Nagravision's position is that the Commission should act to require that Cablevision and NDS participate in a technical standards-setting process with other affected parties to develop a single, nationally-portable, "downloadable" system as a successor to the CableCARD system. Moreover, the Commission should continue to require cable operators rely on a single, common, nationally available conditional access technology when a new system succeeds the existing CableCARD system.
