**Re: Notification of *Ex Parte* Communication
PS Docket No. 06-229, WT Docket Nos. 06-150 and 96-86**

Dear Ms. Dortch:

The Public Safety Spectrum Trust Corporation ("PSST") hereby provides notice of a permitted *ex parte* communication.

On June 3, 2009, Chief Harlin R. McEwen, Chairman of the PSST, met with David Furth, Acting Chief, Erika Olsen, Special Counsel (by telephone), and Carol Simpson, Acting Associate Bureau Chief, all of the Commission's Public Safety & Homeland Security Bureau ("PSHSB"). Also in attendance and participating in the meeting were the following:

Deputy Chief Christopher Moore, San Jose (CA) Police Department
Representing the Major Cities Chiefs Association
Deputy Chief Charles Dowd, NY City Police Department (by telephone)

Deputy Chief Moore, who was not able to attend the meeting with the PSHSB on May 29, 2009, emphasized that the Major Cities Chiefs Association supports the consensus reached among the eight public safety organizations on matters related to the desire of some localities to gain early access to the 700 MHz broadband spectrum currently licensed to the PSST so that they can begin to build out local broadband systems as early as possible. He urged the PSHSB to expedite action on the pending waivers. Deputy Chief Dowd added that the NY City Police Department will be submitting a waiver request in a few days.

Deputy Chief Moore also provided an overview of the consensus reached among the eight public safety organizations:

1. To petition Congress to reallocate the D-Block for public safety use in order to create a single 20 MHz block of broadband spectrum to be licensed to the nationwide Public Safety Broadband Licensee
2. On general approaches regarding levels of service, roaming access, licensing, and technical requirements
3. On the need for sustainable funding for the operations of the PSST.

In addition, the public safety representatives noted that the effort to develop a public safety consensus position on minimum requirements for a nationwide 700 MHz broadband network will begin at a meeting of the National Public Safety Telecommunications Council (NPSTC) in Washington, DC on June 10, 2009.
