
Dear Ms. Dortch,

This letter is to advise you, in accordance with Section 1.1206(b) of the Commission's rules, that on September 24, 2009, Ben Scott and Chris Riley of Free Press; Sascha Meinrath, Daniel Meredith, and Robert Topolski of the New America Foundation's Open Technology Initiative; Chris Libertelli of Skype; Markham Erickson of the Open Internet Coalition; and Rick Whitt and Vinton Cerf of Google met with Paul de Sa, Zachary Katz, Ruth Milkman, Blaise Scinto, Joel Taubenblatt, Jon Peha, Sharon Gillett, John Leibovitz, and Colin Crowell.

We discussed issues related to the National Broadband Plan and Network Neutrality. The meeting was a collective thought experiment, bringing together a range of groups with a variety of different perspectives to discuss the concepts of Internet access services, managed services, and reasonable network management, including possible definitions for managed services and vehicles for the proposed "sixth principle" of transparency. The attached image was distributed as a tool to help guide the discussions, and was not and is not intended to represent the firmly held position of any of the organizations involved.

Additionally, the attached document concerning broadband truth-in-labeling, published today by the New America Foundation's Open Technology Initiative, was distributed at the meeting.
