*A National Broadband Plan for Our Future***

Dear Ms. Dortch:

On Thursday, October 1, 2009, the undersigned met with Blair Levin, Executive Director of the Commission's Omnibus Broadband Initiative ("OBI"), Dr. Carlos Kirjner, Senior Advisor to the Chairman on Broadband, and Steven Rosenberg, Infrastructure Manager in the Office of Strategic Planning and Policy. In the course of that meeting, questions were raised about public libraries' needs for greater broadband connectivity.

Last month, the American Library Association (ALA), Florida State University, and the University of Maryland released a report called "Libraries Connect Communities 3: Public library Funding & Technology Access Study." This report answers many of the questions raised by the FCC officials at the meeting. Findings include:

- 71% of public libraries report that they are the only source of free public access to computers and the Internet in their communities;
- 80% of libraries provide hands-on assistance to patrons for understanding and using e-government resources – up 6% from the previous year;
- 90% of libraries offer formal or informal technology assistance to library users;
and
- 80% of libraries do not have enough computers to meet patron demand at all times of the day.
