On January 13, 2010, Jason E. Friedrich, Senior Director, Broadband Policy, Motorola Global Government Affairs, and Jeffrey A. Campbell, Senior Director, Technology and Trade Policy, Cisco Systems, Inc., met with Phil Bellaria, Director, Scenario Planning, National Broadband Task Force, Bill Lake, Chief, Media Bureau, and Nancy Murphy, Mary Beth Murphy, Steven Broeckaert, Alison Neplokh, and Brendan Murray of the Media Bureau.

In the meeting, we discussed innovation in the marketplace for set-top boxes and video devices generally, including the growing number of TVs and TV-connected devices that can access Internet content and applications. We indicated our support for the Commission's broadband deployment and adoption goals and urged that the Commission continue to pursue policies that promote investment in faster and more efficient broadband networks. We also discussed whether and to what extent navigation devices can play a significant role in increasing broadband adoption. Our comments were consistent with filings Motorola and Cisco have made in the above-captioned proceedings.
