

David Sutphen, co-chair of the AT&T-funded Internet Innovation Alliance, says that Net Neutrality is a "distraction" that "only concerns those already online." Sutphen calls Net Neutrality rules "divisive new regulations," which could have "unintended consequences" for those seeking to bridge the digital divide.

AT&T has made it quite clear that they don't intend to offer any internet service in my rural neighborhood, except dial-up. There is no cable.

"The reasoning [of Net Neutrality detractors] seems to be that if we give broadband providers the legal authority to discriminate on content, which will allow them to increase their profits, they will suddenly become benevolent and invest in expanding their networks or lower broadband prices.
