Dear Chairman Genachowski:

My name is Jeff McGinnis and I am the audio engineer for the American Airlines Center in Dallas, Texas. This is the home for the NHL Dallas Stars and NBA Dallas Mavericks. I would like to let you know that it is very critical to protect the wireless space that we currently use for sporting events and concerts events.

On a game night, between the television broadcasts and in house production show, there are over 40 channels of wireless microphones, in ear monitors, IFB's, and intercom being used. And if either of these broadcast are a national show, the wireless count of frequencies can double. If the licensing of these frequencies will help protect the space, I would be willing to do that as the options of loosing the number of frequencies would impact not only the experience that the fans in the arena enjoy, but also the television broadcast.

I organize and coordinate all incoming media, broadcasters, and the in arena show so they have free and clear space to operate in our building without interference. Without the free and clear space the broadcast, local media, and in arena show would not be able to perform and the impact of this would be devastating.

Please allow provisions to keep space clear or buy license for frequencies needed so all parties can continue to operate without interference.
