Dear Ms. Dortch:

On March 3, 2010, Michael Regan, Executive Vice President, Government Affairs and Maureen O'Connell, Senior Vice President, Government Affairs, News Corporation; and Ron Wheeler, Senior Vice President, Content Protection, Fox Group, met separately with Bradley Gillen of Commissioner Baker's office and Rick Kaplan of Commissioner Clyburn's office to discuss matters relating to the use of selectable output control ("SOC") technology and to the open Internet rulemaking as part of the above-referenced proceedings.

With respect to SOC, the parties discussed the arguments made in the waiver petition, submitted to the Commission on May 9, 2008 by the Motion Picture Association of America, Inc. ("MPAA"), of which Twentieth Century Fox Film Corp., a News Corporation company, is a member. They also discussed MPAA's reply comments in the SOC proceeding, submitted to the Commission on July 31, 2008. The petition and reply comments explained that the pro-consumer purpose of the requested waiver is to enable movie studios to offer millions of Americans in-home access to high-value, high definition video content. They also discussed the mechanics and expenses that would be involved in getting new high-value content to consumers' homes. Finally, they reiterated the points made in MPAA's letter to the Commission submitted as part of the SOC proceeding on November 4, 2009.

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With respect to the open Internet rulemaking, the parties discussed the points made in MPAA's comments filed as part of these proceedings including, specifically, the role that protection of content online plays in broadband adoption. The parties also reviewed the range of anti-piracy actions and technologies available in the marketplace today, as well as information about the importance of permitting Internet service providers to adapt and use technological advancements as they develop. Mr. Wheeler also discussed the necessity for finding room to guarantee quality of service for audio/visual content, whether through managed services or reasonable network management.
