On June 14, 2010, Paul Margie, Ed Thomas, and Rob Carter of Wiltshire & Grannis LLP, Alex Phillips of WISPA, Mark Gibson and Chris Hardy of Comsearch, Dave Gurney of Motorola, John Malyar of Telcordia, Megan Stull of Google, Paul Lambert of Marvell Semiconductor, Leo Fitzsimon of Nokia, Neil Keon and Ian Trumpower of WSdb, Paula Boyd and Paul Garnett of Microsoft, Kerry Murray of Dell, Peter Tenhula of Shared Spectrum Company, Shawn Vasell of Hewlett-Packard, and Christian Duffus of Spectrum Bridge met with Commissioner Michael Copps and John Giusti of the FCC.

The group discussed: (1) the technology industry's commitment to white spaces investment and innovation; (2) the benefits to consumers from white spaces technologies; (3) the group's support for limited Part 15 treatment of non-Part 74 wireless microphones and opposition to expansion of Part 74 eligibility; (4) that the FCC should, in considering pending petitions for reconsideration, allow either a geolocation/database or spectrum sensing solution to interference concerns (but not mandate the use of both), along with the equipment certification safeguards and reserved channels already in the FCC's order; (5) the need to designate multiple TVWS database providers; (6) how further delay and/or over-restrictive rules would drive investment away from white spaces technology; and (7) how white spaces devices could use other frequencies in the TV band if the FCC were to re-pack the TV bands.
