Dear Ms. Dortch:

On November 1, 2010, CTIA – The Wireless Association® (“CTIA”) met with Brad Gillen of the Office of Commissioner Meredith Attwell Baker to discuss traffic pumping issues in the above-referenced dockets. CTIA was represented by Scott Bergmann, Assistant Vice President, Regulatory Affairs, David Redl, Director, Regulatory Affairs, and Jackie McCarthy, Director, State Regulatory Affairs; as well as the following member company representatives: Mike Fingerhut and Norina Moy, Sprint Nextel; Garnet Hanley, T-Mobile USA, Inc.; Peter Connolly, Holland & Knight on behalf of U.S. Cellular; Tamara Preiss, Verizon; and, Elaine Critides, Verizon Wireless.

In the meeting, CTIA urged the Commission to take action now to address traffic pumping. Traffic pumping schemes are proliferating across the country; thus, Commission action in this area cannot wait for comprehensive intercarrier compensation reform. Consistent with the National Broadband Plan’s recommendations, the Commission should take “interim steps to address ... access stimulation.”¹ The Commission’s action in this area should address all types of traffic (including intra-MTA traffic) and all types of providers (including CLECs).

The discussion in the meeting was consistent with the attached presentation, which was distributed to meeting attendees. Pursuant to Section 1.1206 of the Commission’s rules, a copy of this letter, along with the attachment, is being filed via ECFS with your office.
