**RE: Chairman Genachowski's Proposed Regulations
on "Net Neutrality"**

Dear Commissioner Clyburn:

Thank you so much for your past support of net neutrality. I am writing to seek your support in improving the regulations proposed by Chairman Julius Genachowski. His plan fails on so many fronts:

It fails to protect Net Neutrality for people who access the Internet using wireless devices. There is only one Internet: Users must be free to access any legal website, service or application whether they're at home or using a mobile phone. Thus, the rule needs to extend full Net Neutrality protections to both wired and wireless Internet users.

It fails to prevent new "paid prioritization" schemes planned by industry. We can't let AT&T and Comcast charge steep tolls to speed up the sites and services of a few media giants while slowing down everyone else. Thus, it must have stronger language to prohibit these "paid prioritization" schemes, which serve only to give phone and cable companies the power to pick winners and losers on the Internet.

It fails to close massive loopholes. The FCC can't let Verizon build a new "private Internet" under the guise of "specialized services" that would stifle competition and innovation. Therefore, the rule needs to close these loopholes for "specialized services" that allow industry to discriminate unfairly online.



It fails to restore the FCC's authority, which was stripped away during a Bush-era frenzy of deregulation. If the FCC doesn't "reclassify" its broadband authority under Title II of the Communications Act, it risks making Net Neutrality rules that will be tossed out in court right away. Thus, the rule must ensure that Net Neutrality rests on a secure legal foundation that can withstand a court challenge.

I sincerely hope you will continue to champion the cause for real net neutrality. Thank you for considering this letter.
