Dear Ms. Dortch:

On Thursday, February 10, 2011, Danielle Coffey, Telecommunications Industry Association (TIA); Rebecca Schwartz, TIA; Brian Scarpelli, TIA; and Douglas Cooper, OneChip Photonics, Inc. met with Angela Kronenberg, Wireline Legal Advisor, Office of Commissioner Mignon Clyburn.

During this meeting, TIA discussed its Innovation Agenda, a path conceived by TIA that, through light-touch, market-based, and technology neutral approaches to regulation, trade, research and development, tax policy, and education, will result in job growth – both within and outside the ICT sector – due to the criticality of the industry. TIA's Innovation Agenda is appended to this Notice.

TIA also discussed the Commission's efforts to comprehensively reform the Universal Service Fund, urging an efficient and coordinated shift towards the support of broadband services as quickly as possible under a unified Connect America Fund. TIA stated its support for this effort, particularly transitioning the Lifeline and Link Up programs to support broadband, and agreed that reforms of this nature are excellent steps towards providing affordable service to all Americans.

TIA also noted its support of comprehensive reform to the current intercarrier compensation regime. TIA encouraged adopting reforms that encourage innovative communications services and applications in a technology- and competitively-neutral

fashion that will to foster more rapid deployment of broadband networks to unleash the benefits of evolving technologies.

TIA also discussed its activity in ensuring accessibility to telecommunications for disabled individuals. Recently, TIA has held extensive meetings with Commission staff on hearing aid compatibility, has facilitated a dialogue between TIA member companies and the disabled community, has worked to advance the Chairman's "Awards for Advancement of Accessibility (AAA)" program, and is represented by a co-chair of the Emergency Access Advisory Committee (EAAC). TIA noted that it plans to continue its focus on access for disabled individuals, consistent with the goals of the Commission.
