
On Monday, August 8, 2011, the Coalition of Organizations for Accessible Technology (“COAT”), represented by, Jenifer Simpson, Senior Director for Government Affairs, American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD); Eric Bridges, Director of Advocacy and Governmental Affairs, American Council of the Blind (ACB); Mark Richert, Director of Public Policy, American Foundation for the Blind (AFB); and Andrew Phillips, Policy Attorney, National Association of the Deaf Law (NAD), met with Amy Levine, Special Counsel to Chairman Genachowski, and Elizabeth Lyle, Wireless Telecommunications Bureau, to discuss the above referenced matters.

COAT raised a few points about Advanced Communications Systems (“ACS”) such as the scope of coverage, achievability rules, exemptions, waivers, and enforcement. COAT stressed the importance of accessibility and usability of ACS for people with disabilities in the future and the crucial link to reducing the disproportionately high rate of unemployment experienced by people with disabilities when advanced communications

services and devices are not commonly available and designed with accessibility and usability.

COAT discussed the implementation of rules for Video Description and the need to interpret the law broadly in order to follow Congress' intent of making television accessible for people with visual impairments. COAT raised concerns about delays in implementation and the need for accessible guides/listings of audio described programming.
