Dear Ms. Dortch:

On January 4, 2012, Philip A. Falcone of Harbinger Capital Partners, Jeffrey Carlisle of LightSquared Subsidiary LLC, and Ashley Durmer, consultant to Harbinger, met with Edward Lazarus, as Chief of Staff of the Chairman, Amy Levine, as Special Counsel & Legal Advisor to the Chairman, and Paul de Sa, as Chief of the Office of Strategic Planning & Policy Analysis.

In the meeting, Harbinger and LightSquared urged the Commission to continue to work toward a resolution that would enable the commencement of commercial service over the LightSquared network. We emphasized the significant investment that has already been made in reliance on LightSquared's longstanding ATC authority and the Commission-imposed network deployment milestones, as well as the numerous customers that have already committed to use LightSquared capacity.

We also reiterated that LightSquared has invested millions of dollars during the past 12 months in conducting tests and developing filtering solutions to resolve issues with GPS receiver design that causes devices to look into spectrum licensed to LightSquared. As a result, the scope of the GPS technical issues has been narrowed considerably. We discussed various alternative technical solutions that will effectively and economically allow GPS devices to work as intended, and still allow the deployment of the LightSquared network. We reiterated that LightSquared has proposed to deploy initially at significantly reduced power levels --- parameters that were expressly approved by all affected parties in 2005.

In addition to the proceedings listed above, we discussed the separate petition for declaratory ruling filed by LightSquared in December, 2011. We explained that the purpose of the filing was to obtain a clear decision from the Commission that GPS manufacturers are not entitled to interference protection when they sell devices that look into LightSquared's spectrum, and thus that GPS manufacturers have no right to the indefinite free use of L-band spectrum they have demanded.
