

Attn: Mr. Hernandez

I had talked to Mr. Hernandez (of the FCC) recently regarding the inability to contact the FCC from the pay phones at 200 Tramway (outside the Smiths)

here in Albuquerque from a motel near Eubank and I-40. There have been other difficulties with telecommunications recently (for example at a bus stop across from the Best Choice Inn when I called APD after getting off the Route 66 (#732 if the receipt for the bus fair was accurate)

Do to an overcrowded bus. A large woman with a wheel chair was getting on the bus and the bus driver said that he needed to put the seats down (the bus did not have very much standing room available). For safety reasons I opted to get off the bus and wait for the next route 66 bus. When I stood up and started to gather my possessions to get off the bus I noticed that a woman (50s or 60s) reached behind me as if to touch my back pack. When I made the call from the bus stop after getting of the bus I sat my belongings on the west side of the bus stop (on the North side of Central)

After explaining that somebody reached behind me and the bus was overcrowded I looked to my bags to see that some Duct Tape was partially removed from the outside of my back pack and that some small bags were missing from a larger bag. A second call to APD was made from that bus stop, however I was almost immediatly disconnected. Route 66 bus (#705) arrived at the bus stop not that long afterwards and I boarded the bus (westbound again) and made another call to APD from the same cell phone as a vehicle with out a license tag passed a Route 66 bus at approximatly Central and San Pedro. Upon arriving at the Bank of the West I was greeted by a woman with black hair (that later said her name was Tonya and she was the manager there). Upon requesting a list of transactions all all the way back to the summer of 2007 I was told that I would be charge \$4.00 per month for the statements. I told her that I would sit there and think about what I wanted to do and ask to borrow a pen from one of the cashiers to right some notes on what had just happened at the bus stop.

Help was offered by a woman with the name D'Arco (according to the name on the desk of the center of the three desks on the south side of the first floor of the building on the North-East corner of San Mateo and Central).

I started to look for notes on a previous visit to the Bank on my computer but wasn't having much luck. She printed out a list of transactions including transactions from previous years and offered a small cup of water to me (about a four ounce cup that was not more than 3/4 full). A young man came in and sat with the woman (with brunette hair) in the office to the west of my office (the west-most of the three offices). "D'Arco" said that if I need anything else that she will be in the other office and went to the east-most of the three offices. To my surprise the woman that had initially greeted me came into the center office while I was still sitting there and told me that I had to leave (or similar). She said that her name was Tonya and that she was the manager there. I used the same cell phone as at the bus stop again to call APD and reported that the woman did not have a name tag and that she was telling me that I had to leave. I let her talk to the call taker on the cell phone and she turned her body (clockwise as viewed from above) by about 120 degrees (from facing me to facing the North) and either talked or acted like she was talking to the police in a low voice and was saying that there was no emergency. After getting off the phone she said that I have to leave and to wait outside for the police. She said that she would walk me outside and we walked to the outside of the North side of the building. A fire truck was in the parking lot to the North of the building. I tried to make a call from the outside of the business at 4603 Central N.E. to the FCC (on the south side of the building) and not more than 20 feet west of an APD car (G70 if I remember correctly), however I was disconnected before explaining the previous communication difficulties of that day. All though this report could be more complete I will exit from this discussion.
