This notice is submitted in fulfillment of Section 1.1206(b) of the Commission's Rules.

On January 23, 2012, a delegation of public interest organizations met with members of the Commission staff. Member of the delegation were Andrew Jay Schwartzman, Media Access Project, Marty T. Doneghy, AARP, Madura Wijewardena, National Urban League, Michael Calabrese, New America Foundation, Benjamin Lennett, New America Foundation, Olivia Wein, National Consumer Law Center, Matthew Wood, Free Press, Harold Feld, Public Knowledge, Jessica Gonzalez, National Hispanic Media Coalition and Parul Desai, Consumers Union. Commission staff in attendance were Edward Lazarus, Zachary Katz, Jessica Almond, Sherrese Smith and Michael Steffen.

The meeting was largely devoted to other matters, but there were brief presentations relating to several docketed matters.

Andrew Jay Schwartzman called for prompt action to resolve Dockets 93-8, 07-42, 00-168 and 11-189. Michael Calabrese, Matthew Wood, Harold Feld, Jessica Gonzales and Parul Desai concurred in the request for prompt action on Dockets 00-168 and 11-189.

Michael Calabrese urged the Commission to conduct a thorough review with respect to the issues raised in Docket 12-4. He also called on the Commission to augment any buildout requirements adopted in Dockets 11-149 and 11-150 with a "use it or share it" license condition that would permit other parties to make use of unused spectrum in the S Band on a very localized basis until such time as the licensee actually deploys service.

Harold Feld called for prompt resolution of Docket 10-91, noting that Section 629 of the Communications Act requires operators to provide multiple device choices for consumers.

With respect to Docket 00-168, Jessica Gonzalez stressed the importance of insuring online access to letters from members of the public.

Parul Desai called for prompt action on Docket 11-116.
