Dear Ms. Dortch,

I am writing again to express support for LightSquared's plans to bring a much-needed 4G-LTE wireless network to West Virginia and to urge the FCC to act on the company's petition for declaration ruling.

West Virginia currently ranks 48th in broadband availability and the rural nature of our state makes the delivery of traditional broadband service both technically and financially challenging. Addressing these problems while improving wireless broadband speed and reliability is vital if our state is to diversify its economy and create new, technology based jobs.

LightSquared has spent over a decade securing the authorizations and the financing necessary to deploy their innovative, wireless 4G-LTE network. Now, unlicensed and unauthorized users of Lightsquared's spectrum have raised complaints at the 11th hour to deny West Virginians the benefit of this network despite being on notice since 2001 that LightSquared planned to use its licensed spectrum. If the GPS makers had adequately designed their devices in anticipation of these changes, we would not be experiencing the current interference issues.

The need for this service is too great to GPS manufactures to violate the FCC's Part 15 rules and deny innovation in wireless technology by creating interference outside of their licensed spectrum. I hope the FCC will act quickly to consider LightSquared's Petition.
