Dear Ms. Dortch:

On February 1, 2013, Christopher Guttman-McCabe, Brian Josef and Matthew Gerst of CTIA—The Wireless Association®, met with David Turetsky, David Furth, Eric Ehrenreich, Aaron Garza, Tim May, Zenji Nakazawa, Erika Olsen, Eric Schmidt, David Siehl and Dana Zellman of the Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau, regarding issues relevant to the above-listed proceeding.

During the conversation, CTIA noted that comments from numerous parties in this proceeding reflect widespread support for clear, comprehensive, standardized, nationwide limitation of liability protection for all entities participating in any aspects of emergency services access, including NG9-1-1 services. Accordingly, CTIA urged the FCC to recommend that Congress act to ensure liability protection at the national level, for both Federal and state causes of action, for all persons and entities involved in the provision of and access to 9-1-1 services, on a technology-neutral basis.
