

Dear Sir or Ma'am,
Regarding public comment on GN Docket No. 13-86

I implore the current FCC decision makers to maintain the current broadcast indecency policies and to NOT change them to include the f-word or full frontal nudity.

Specifically, I implore the current FCC decision makers to maintain the approach to isolated expletives set forth in its decision in *Complaints Against Various Broadcast Licensees Regarding Their Airing of the "Golden Globe Awards" Program*, Memorandum Opinion and Order, 19 FCC Rcd 4975 (2004).

To be frank, due to the majority of Americans subscribing to cable TV, anyone's desire for the use of the f word and full frontal nudity can be fully satisfied by cable TV. We don't need it on public TV and radio stations.

Additionally, consider the company Apple Inc. Apple Inc. has had a policy of "no nudity" at its company or in the over 250,000 apps that are offered through its company.
