

- 1) Nowhere in the U.S. Constitution does it mention any branch of the Federal government regulating public morals.
- 2) To the degree that the FCC is bound by acts of Congress to violate my point #1, interpretation should err on the side of free speech as much as possible.
- 3) Without \*Clear, Well-Defined, Specific\* rules, it is not possible for broadcasters to fulfill the Commission's requirements. This was my and others' experience during my years in "college" radio (KALX, Berkeley, 1980-1995).
- 4) Attempting to prohibit fleeting expletives prohibits broadcasters from presenting a wide variety of real-world news and other events and content for the sole reason of someone inadvertently using a word which is part of their everyday real-world speaking vocabulary.
