

Subject: FCC Reduces Backlog of Broadcast Indecency Complaints by 70% (More Than One Million Complaints); Seeks Comment on Adopting Egregious Cases Policy

The FCC should be allowed to reduce Backlog of Broadcast Indecency Complaints by 70%, and change the policies that are currently in place.
