**Policies Regarding Mobile Spectrum Holdings; Expanding Economic and Innovation Opportunities of Spectrum Through Incentive Auctions; Fixed and Mobile Services in the Mobile Satellite Service Bands at 1525-1559 MHz and 1626.5-1660.5 MHz, 1610-1626.5 MHz and 2483.5-2500 MHz, and 2000-2020 MHz and 2180-2200 MHz**

Dear Ms. Dortch:

On Wednesday, June 05, 2013, Neville Ray, Tom Sugrue, Kathleen O'Brien Ham, and Steve Sharkey of T-Mobile USA, Inc. ("T-Mobile") met with Commissioner Jessica Rosenworcel and David Goldman, her senior legal advisor. During the meeting, the T-Mobile representatives discussed T-Mobile's spectrum priorities, including making additional spectrum available for competitive access through the incentive auction process in the 600 MHz band and pairing the 1755-1780 MHz band with the AWS-3 band. The T-Mobile representatives thanked the Commissioner for her leadership on spectrum and for her bold ten ideas as outlined in her recent speech at CTIA.<sup>1</sup>

With respect to the incentive auctions, T-Mobile's representatives emphasized the importance of adopting a band plan for the 600 MHz band spectrum that maximizes the amount of spectrum made available for mobile broadband service. Additionally, they explained that T-Mobile has never sought to exclude AT&T or Verizon from participating in the incentive auction, and has recently provided for a clear exception to a 1/3 below 1 GHz cap that permits AT&T and Verizon to bid in all markets – even those where they exceed the cap.

With regard to pairing AWS-3 with the 1755-1780 MHz band, the T-Mobile representatives emphasized that progress has been made on creating an industry roadmap for clearing and sharing with federal systems in the 1755-1780 MHz band. They also indicated that the spectrum monitoring efforts in the 1755-1780 MHz band have provided useful supportive information for the roadmap. The T-Mobile representatives also expressed interest in working with the Commissioner on further evaluating her ideas for freeing up additional federal spectrum.
