To Whom it May Concern:

I write to provide Comments to the FCC on the E-Rate NPRM, proceeding 13-184. The E-Rate has been of great importance to my school because it has helped our students and teachers gain access to a wealth of online resources, to communicate and collaborate, and to develop the 21st century skills necessary for college and career. However, E-Rate funding levels have not kept pace with my school's future bandwidth needs. I urge you to consider raising the E-rate funding level to at least \$5 billion per year, which is close to the average demand level for each of the past two years.

As a Technology Coordinator in Louisiana, I know that seamlessly infusing digital learning throughout the school curriculum is a pre-requisite for students to graduate from high school with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in today's global economy. Access to high speed broadband is the key for modern teaching and learning to occur in all schools across the country.

At Mount Carmel Elementary we use digital learning to personalize learning, meet common core state standards, administer online assessments, and make data driven decisions. An example of digital learning at Mount Carmel is all of our English Language Arts, and Science textbooks in the junior high are online, so that the students have access to them at home without having to bring the large textbook home. There are activities and assignments for them to do to reinforce what we are learning in the classroom. In the classroom, the teachers use streaming video to bring to life much of what they teach. The students are encouraged to go beyond what they are seeing in the classroom, to delve further into their areas of interest, and high-speed internet makes this an easy task.

Mount Carmel is currently just keeping up with demand, and the need for a high speed reliable network is only going to increase in the near future.

The E-rate program has been a phenomenal success in bringing Internet access to almost every classroom in America. In the last funding cycle applications from schools and libraries totaled more than \$5 billion, more than double the available funding. I respectfully urge the FCC to increase funding for the E-Rate program to at least \$5 billion to meet this demand. All students need access to high speed broadband. Our nation's future depends on their success.

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
