
In regards to your proposal to allow cell phone use on planes during flights, I am writing as a passenger who believes this will have a negative impact on fellow passengers, and may also become a source of compromised personal safety on aircrafts.

While understanding that research indicates the use of cell phones does not appear to interfere with the operation of airplanes, those of us who travel often can picture being next to a fellow passenger who chooses to use their cell phone without concern as to the impact it is having on others around them. And because transcontinental flights involve many hours of travel in the USA, the potential is for situations in which passengers become very angry at this disturbance. With the combination of alcohol being served, it is not hard to picture belligerent passengers refusing to cooperate with the flight crew if there are complaints.

Quiet cars on Amtrak service, as well as our local commuter rail service here in Boston, reflect the desire by many to have some peace of mind when they travel, and to not be confronted with ongoing interference. While recognizing there are many who would use this privilege responsibly, my belief is that this will cause a great deal of unnecessary tension not only for all the passengers, but also the flight crew.

Recalling the days when smoking was permitted on flights – I'm 59 and took my first flight when I was 9 months old – we realize how second hand smoke harmed the health of many people. Allowing passengers to have unlimited access to their cell phones in flight is a decision which I believe will not be in the best interest of the traveling public, and so wish to convey my disapproval of this plan.

Regarding: Cell phone usage on flights


Greetings Federal Communication Commission,
