

There is no need for “one size fits all” FCC regulation of cell tower siting. New York State’s Adirondack Park is an example of a case where state and local control is working. There is a 12-year history of success in siting cell towers in an environmentally sustainable way in the Park, where cell towers are required to remain essentially invisible. There is no compelling need for the FCC to preempt State and local regulations that work. Cell towers can and will continue to be introduced into the Adirondack Park in a way that’s consistent with Adirondack values. The FCC shouldn’t jump to solve “problems” that don’t exist.
