ICN is the licensee of low power television station KSDY-LD, San Diego, California. It fears loss of its spectrum in the upcoming spectrum repack and auction, which threaten to concentrate spectrum resources in the hands of large networks with no compensation to many small businesses, including ICN, from which those resources may be taken.


ICN explained the history of KSDY-LD, starting on analog Channel 61, then being forced by spectrum reallocation to move to a lower channel, finding Channel 38, and then losing that channel to Mexico because of an international security issue at the border. After many years of effort and great expense (engineering, operations, etc.), the station finally was able to obtain a construction permit to operate on Channel 50, where it operates today.

In light of the station's unique history, involving losing a channel for national security reasons, as well as its minority ownership and its desire to provide innovative broadcast services to the public, ICN urged the Commission to find a way to protect KSDY-LD during the repacking process and international negotiations with Mexico. Mexico deployed its analog to digital transition, with Tijuana, Baja California, becoming the first in the country to "switchover". Channel 50 is able to capture over two million households where more than half are Hispanic.

This is one of the many reasons why Channel 50 focuses on the local community and small businesses. Currently, Channel 50 broadcasts three sub-channels; 50.1 Milenio (24/7 News in Spanish), 50.2 VeriaLiving (Organic Healthy Lifestyle), 50.3 BereaVision (Local Entertainment, Religion programming in both Spanish and English).

ICN respectfully requests the support of the FCC during the challenges of the spectrum auction and repacking.
