Dear Ms. Dortch:

On February 10, 2014, Paul Bradshaw, Senior Counsel for Sunesys, LLC (“Sunesys”), Walter Tustin, Vice President of Sunesys, and the undersigned met with Lisa Hone, Mark Walker, James Bachtell, Bryan Boyle, Charles Eberle, and Soumitra Das of the Wireline Competition Bureau, Jon Chambers and Nick Alexander of the Office of Strategic Planning and Policy Analysis, and Michael Steffen of the Office of the Managing Director.

Sunesys discussed that in connection with the services it provides: (i) the charges are lower than tariffed rates; (ii) no school district or library is receiving less than 1 Gbps from Sunesys, and some customers are now requesting 10 Gbps; (iii) the difference in pricing between 100 Mbps and 1Gbps is almost negligible; and (iv) the difference in pricing between 1 Gbps and 10 Gbps is relatively small, and particularly in comparison to the one thousand percent greater capacity that the higher-speed offering provides.

Sunesys emphasized that in setting targets the Commission should ensure that its goals are not quickly outdated. In that regard, Sunesys stated that it believes that in approximately five years 100 Mbps may be viewed as 56 kbps is today. In a similar vein, Sunesys discussed the future-proof benefits of fiber. Finally, Sunesys also recommended that the Commission allow five year

contracts under the e-rate program, as well as encourage consortium applications for high-speed broadband.
