Petition for Closed Captioning Exemption
Dismissal of Petition

Dear Mr. Doellman:

The Consumer and Governmental Affairs Bureau (Bureau) of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) advises you that, for the reasons stated below, your above-referenced petition for exemption from the FCC's closed captioning rules has been dismissed as incomplete.

The Bureau advised you by letter dated September 26, 2013, that, unless you submitted the information and materials outlined in the Bureau's letter that were missing from your petition by October 28, 2013, your petition would be dismissed.¹ As cautioned in the Bureau's letter, your petition is dismissed without prejudice as of the date of this letter, on February 11, 2014, because you failed to submit the required information about the costs associated with captioning your program. In specific, the two captioning quotes must be documented, specific to the program, and annualized.

We remind you that, as also noted in the Bureau's letter, with this dismissal, you must comply with the FCC's closed captioning requirements contained in Part 79 of the FCC's rules with regard to the programming that was the subject of your petition.
