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Choice of ISP is extremely limited in the United States, even in major urban areas. Comcast and AOL/Time Warner have repeatedly asserted in anti-competitiveness proceedings that most end users have a choice of multiple ISPs, by deceptively including woefully inadequate services like dial-up and mobile when compiling their research. The average Internet user is unable to perform daily Internet activities like video and music consumption without a proper broadband Internet connection, and having lived in multiple urban centers in the last several years I can say firsthand that there is almost always a single broadband provider that dominates an apartment complex or neighborhood. Allowing AOL/Time Warner and Comcast to merge would be an extremely dangerous and highly anti-competitive move that would have major repercussions for a userbase that already has very little power to negotiate faster speeds or lower prices. It's time we catch up to the speeds available in Europe and Asia by encouraging more competition in the broadband market, not stifling it by allowing two of the largest entities to merge and dominate the industry.
