Dear Ms. Dortch:

On June 13, 16, and 17, 2014, Rear Adm. Jamie Barnett of Venable LLP, on behalf of Telcordia Technologies, Inc., d/b/a iconectiv (“Telcordia”), spoke with Allan Manuel of the Public Safety & Homeland Security Bureau. On the calls, Telcordia indicated that prior to releasing its bid documents under the second-level protective order in this proceeding, it is willing to redact, at the request of the Public Safety & Homeland Security Bureau, certain information that the Bureau has determined could threaten national security if released publically. The parties also discussed the specific passages that should be redacted.

On, June 16, 2014, Tara O’Neill Diaz and Joel Zamlong of Telcordia, Mark Davis of this firm, and I, on behalf of Telcordia, spoke by telephone with Michele Ellison, Diane Griffin Holland, Jim Bird, Joel Rabinovitz and Neil Dellar of the Office of the General Counsel, and Ann Stevens and Sanford Williams of the Wireline Competition Bureau. On the call, Telcordia discussed the status of the national-security redactions, which Telcordia expects to finish quickly. Telcordia also expressed its willingness to publically release portions of certain bid documents and to release other portions under a first-level protective order. Telcordia indicated that it is in the process of reviewing the documents to determine which information is Highly Confidential or Confidential and which information can be released publically.

Telcordia also indicated that transcripts of meetings with NAPM LLC contain Telcordia’s Highly Confidential Information and emphasized that it important for Telcordia to have an opportunity to designate which portions of those transcripts are Highly Confidential before they are released to the public.


