


Tribal Engagement Summary 2013

Advanced Communications Technology, Inc.

The Wind River Reservation (see map below) is approximately 2.2 million acres in size, and is home to the Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapaho Tribes. Reservation land categories include a mixture of Tribal Trust, Tribal Allotted, Bureau of Reclamation withdrawal/ceded, and deeded or fee lands owned mostly by non-Tribal residents. Each Tribe has a ½ undivided interest in all Tribal Trust Lands. The Reservation is governed by a Joint Business Council (JBC) comprised of individual Business Council members of both Tribes. The JBC works in partnership with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) in matters of Trust and Fiduciary responsibilities. Any activity affecting Tribal lands within the exterior boundary of the Reservation requires approval and resolution of the JBC; and permitting by the BIA.



Primary Reservation Communities

Fort Washakie. Fort Washakie is home to most Tribal and Federal government entities serving the Reservation, including the Shoshone Business Council (SBC), JBC, BIA, Indian Health Service (IHS) Clinic/Hospital, Fort Washakie School, Tribal DEQ, USFW, Housing Authorities, Law Enforcement, and various Shoshone Tribal enterprises. Fort Washakie is about 7 miles from the Shoshone Tribe's Shoshone Rose Casino.

Ethete. Ethete is home to the Arapaho Business Council, the Wind River Tribal College, Little Wind Casino (Arapaho Tribe), Wind River Indian High School, Ethete Middle School, and various Arapaho Tribal enterprises.

Arapahoe. Arapahoe is home to an IHS clinic/hospital extension, Arapahoe School and various Arapaho Tribal enterprises. Arapahoe is about 5 miles from the Arapaho Tribe's Big Wind Casino. (*note: Arapaho are the "people"; and Arapahoe is the "place".*)

Crowheart. Crowheart serves primarily as a gathering place for rural residents living in the far western part of the Reservation.

The communities of **Kinnear, Pavillion and Riverton** are located on ceded Reservation land. Even though they are located within the exterior boundary of the Reservation, they are not subject to Reservation authority. Riverton (pop Est 10,000) is the commercial hub of Fremont County. Many Reservation residents do their shopping in Riverton, seek additional medical attention; and due to a shortage of housing elsewhere on the Reservation, seek housing in Riverton.

Tribal Engagement Obligations Ongoing (2006 to 2013)

Since the fiber optic infrastructure was lit in 2006, ACT and DTE (*Range Family Affiliate*) have continued working with both Tribes to bring additional Tribal entities on line. Advanced Communications Technology, Inc. (ACT) Tribal Engagement Record, 2013

ACT serves as Competitive Local Exchange Carrier (CLEC) in the Ethete, Fort Washakie, Crowheart, and Arapahoe exchanges. In conjunction with affiliate DTE, ACT has committed to assist both Tribes, consulting and working to address issues and needs in efforts to expand, not only the availability of broadband services, but the use of those services. DTE's General Manager, who also serves as the Corporation's Tribal Point of Contact for all Indian Affairs in Wyoming, routinely visits with Tribal Leaders and the BIA to discuss communications issues and opportunities.

2013 Highlights

- Baldwin & Crocker (Arapaho Attorneys). Conference call to discuss existing fiber route and obstacles to finishing Ethete to Arapahoe route.
- Numerous interactions with Adam Patrick Lawson, Tribal Entrepreneur and GM of Wind River Internet, a Northern Arapaho Tribal Industries (NATI) company, that provides last mile wireless broadband to residents of the Wind River Indian Reservation (WRIR).
 - Provided Reservation fiber map and advice for appearance before SBC to expand service in Fort Washakie area.
 - DTE & ACT worked with NATI to turn up ethernet circuits for Wind River Internet in Ethete and Fort Washakie.
 - Arranged for Wyoming Select Committee on Tribal Relations to hear presentation from Adam Lawson about his efforts to provide broadband to Reservation residents.
 - Provided Adam with introduction to Troy Babbitt, Broadband Enterprise Architect, Wyoming Department of Enterprise Technology Services.
 - Recommended Wind River Internet as a presenting company at Annual Wyoming Broadband Summit in October.
- Received final BIA permit to plow fiber to Big Wind Hall. Fiber installed to Big Wind and Crowheart School, mid-May. (both locations in Crowheart Exchange)
- Late May Visit to IHS and update on pending fiber build to IHS facilities in Fort Washakie and Arapaho. Met with Rick Brannon, Director and Lena Whiteman, Site Manager. Given name of Dwayne Stiffarm, IT manager at Arapahoe to coordinate.
 - Follow up meeting in July to check on satisfaction with new service. Met with and escorted around by Leta Whiteman, Site Manager. She indicated that upgraded service has made a big difference.
- Several visits over course of the year with Brett White, Executive Director of the Wind River Development Fund (WRDF). Discussions about Tribal Cloud initiatives, Distance Education (higher learning) for Tribal members, WRDF developed business management software.
 - Brief visits with George Guina, WRDF IT support. General discussions about bandwidth needs, QOS and opportunities at Fort Washakie.
 - DTE GM asked to serve as Associate Board Member of WRDF...may accept pending discussion of potential conflict of interest.
- Several meetings and updates with IT managers for Wind River Indian/Ethete Middle School; and Fort Washakie Schools to discuss additional bandwidth needs, help relocate some fiber facilities and provide advice for pending new schools construction.
 - Courtesy visits to TERO assisting with updated compliance requirements for communications companies working on the WRIR.

2013 Highlights, Continued

- Courtesy visits with Clint Wagon, Project Manager for Shoshone Rose Casino expansion. Discussed challenges for adequate bandwidth to casino as well as other options for bandwidth provision.
- Courtesy visits to Fort Washakie to discuss service options for Shoshone Tribal Credit Union, Tribal Housing move, Tribal Health Clinic, Tribal law enforcement, Tribal Dialysis center. Provided recommendations and alternatives that could save on construction costs. Also recommended Tribal entities ask local Tribal Wireless Entrepreneur-Wind River Internet for a bid to provide service.
- Testified before the Wyoming Legislature Select Committee on Tribal Relations in July about the state of Broadband Connectivity on the Reservation. Also introduced Patrick Adam Lawson, Wind River Internet, to the committee. The Committee was impressed at the work Wind River Internet has accomplished in bringing last mile broadband to residents of the Reservation.
 - Opportunities for quick visits/updates with members of both Business Councils in attendance. Also visited and updated with both Tribal Liaisons (Gary Collins and Sara Robinson). Additional contacts included Pat Moss, Great Plains Utility Director, Allison Sage, Northern Arapaho Tribal Health Director, Cathy Keene, Eastern Shoshone Tribal Health Director, Rep. Patrick Goggles, Committee Co-Chair and member of Northern Arapaho Tribe.
- Provided general DTE and ACT staff assistance throughout the year for equipment recommendations and configurations, troubleshooting problems, cost estimates for various planning scenarios.

Summary

The expansion of fiber optic connectivity, beyond serving area, and across the Wind River Reservation, to the Range Family fiber network necessitated broader participation and dialogue with the Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapaho Tribes. Building trust with the Tribes is a slow and deliberate process. Tribal engagement is a necessary and ongoing process to maintain that trust. In summary, working with the Tribes has created a win-win, for the Reservation and for the Range Family of companies.
