The Internet is the common carrier for the 21st century, and should be regulated as such: under Title II, like every other common carrier.

Furthermore, any sort of payments or charges to an Internet Service Provider in order to obtain priority or faster network access for packets travelling from/to one party compared to packets travelling through the same network from/to other parties should be expressly forbidden. If I'm paying an Internet Service Provider (ISP) for Internet access, no other party should be allowed to pay my ISP to either speed up or slow down some proportion of the traffic to/from me compared to the rest of the traffic to/from me on the connection from me through my ISP to the main Internet backbone links: that's the portion of the trip that I'm paying for, and no one else should be able to pay to modify the service I get in any way that could make any portion of the data move slower. However, they obviously should be allowed to pay their ISP for a better connection from their computer through their ISP to the main Internet backbone -- that's the portion of the trip that they're paying for, and they're welcome to pay for a better connection.
