Dear Ms. Dortch,

I hope this letter finds you well.

I am writing to you on behalf of Joink, LLC, a small business operating in West-Central
Indiana and East-Central Illinois. We operate as a Wireless Internet Service Provider (WISP)
in nine rural and low-income counties.

I have read and agree with WISPA's filing ET Docket Number 13-49. For Joink, and Joink
customers, this is a catastrophic ruling.

Often times, our customers have the choice of Joink fixed wireless, satellite, or cellular. The
latter two cannot offer the same performance or latency of Joink's network. There are many
locations we simply could not serve with the new power restrictions, leaving hundreds of
customers without quality broadband access. While other frequencies might allow us to
service these customers, those technologies are either too expensive for the rural and poor
areas we serve, or cannot offer the same high performance services our customers require.
Simply, Joink would be forced to discontinue service to a number of communities.

I urge the commission to reconsider their rules related to the 5725-5850 MHz band.
