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Perhaps the focus should be on the potential hazard which currently exists to Directv consumers because of improper, unmonitored, unsafe installations of grounding circuits of Directv's systems by their authorized contractors. It appears this company can go unregulated and unmonitored, and not be held to their own Professional Standard Installation Guidelines. How many people are at risk for property damage, personal injury or death, and how much money has been lost in the Insurance industry through these types of claims, easy brushed off onto an unrelated electrical circuit issue. I believe the FCC, state and local enforcement offices, are familiar with this situation, and there are also reports of Investigations through NBC, Legal Firms, trying to bring this matter to the attention of the people. Where are those that are supposed to be protecting the public? Is Directv just going to be able to walk away from this? Will AT&T be forced to address the matter and assume responsibility for the potentially countless number of Directv customers at risk? Per Directv's guidelines, "This is an extremely important step in the DIRECTV installation. If done correctly, it will provide protection against fires and electrical shock for the customer.", yet us customers are left unprotected, and uninformed, until something bad happens. Shouldn't the FCC be more focused upon the current Safety Issue at hand, and force a direction to ensure public safety with this matter, prior to instead just apparently closing their eyes to consumer safety, and focusing more upon enabling the problem to escalate even higher by allowing this merger, and exposing that many more people to the exposed, unregulated, consumer safety hazard? Clean up the mess first, then move forward.
