This letter is to advise you, in accordance with the Commission's rules, that on September 17, 2014, Chris Riley and Denelle Dixon-Thayer of Mozilla spoke with Philip Verveer, Senior Counselor to Chairman Wheeler; Gigi Sohn, Special Counsel to Chairman Wheeler; Jonathan Sallet, General Counsel; Stephanie Weiner, Associate General Counsel; Matthew DelNero, Deputy Bureau Chief, Wireline Competition Bureau; and Eric Feigenbaum, Office of Media Relations.

The substance of our presentation was consistent with the petition submitted by Mozilla to the Commission on May 5, 2014 and comments and reply comments filed by Mozilla, all included in the above referenced dockets. We focused our discussion on the three issues emphasized in our reply comments, namely: 1) Mozilla's proposal for legal articulation of a new category of telecommunications services, Remote End Point (REP) services, offered to edge providers, and issues regarding the concept and its proper classification under the Communications Act; 2) paid prioritization, and Mozilla's position that the Commission should adopt a presumption against such practices as they inherently affect other uses of the Internet access service and therefore pose a risk of harm to choice, competition, and innovation; and 3) mobile services, and Mozilla's position that the Commission should apply the same rules on mobile while structuring the proposed reasonable network management exception to permit appropriate engineering practices.
