Dear Ms. Dortch,

This letter is to advise you, in accordance with the Commission's rules, that on September 17, 2014, Chris Riley of Mozilla met with Scott Jordan, Chief Technology Officer.

The substance of our presentation was consistent with the petition submitted by Mozilla to the Commission on May 5, 2014 and comments and reply comments filed by Mozilla, all included in the above referenced dockets. We discussed Mozilla's proposal for legal articulation of a new category of telecommunications services, Remote End Point (REP) services, offered to edge providers, including the scope of the REP service and how our proposal would treat other architectural constructs within the Internet such as points of interconnection and CDNs. We discussed the issue of prioritization and Mozilla's position that the Commission should adopt a presumption against such practices, as they inherently affect other uses of the Internet access service and therefore pose a risk of harm to choice, competition, and innovation; we also discussed Mozilla's position in our reply comments that user-directed priority, when designed correctly, can alleviate the harms for choice, competition, and innovation that are otherwise posed by prioritization practices. Finally, we discussed Mozilla's position that the Commission should apply the same rules to mobile services while structuring a reasonable network management exception to permit appropriate engineering practices. We offered suggestions presented in our reply comments to provide more guidance to network operators on this issue.
